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What is Online Cruelty or Cyberbullying?

 Online cruelty, also referred to as cyberbullying, takes place whenever someone uses digital media tools such as the Internet and cell phones to deliberately upset or harass someone else, often repeatedly.

- Do you think Ricardo is a Cyberbully? Why or why not?
- What does Ricardo mean when he says that information "gets around really quick"?
- Ricardo thinks that harassing others on Internet, rather than in person, appeals to some teenagers because they can't be attacked back physically.

Key Vocabulary

- Target: A person who is the object of an intentional action
- Offender: A person who has malicious intent to hurt or damage someone, in these cases the Cyberbully
- Escalate: To increase or make more intense

How does this affect the Target?

- Have you or someone you know ever encountered online cruelty? How do you think someone might feel after being the target of it?
- Targets of online cruelty may feel they can be bombarded with negative comments at any time, anywhere. And when more offenders join in the online cruelty, the situation gets even worse.

Additional Key Vocabulary

- Bystander: A person who does nothing when they witness something happening
- Upstander: A person who supports and stands up for someone else
- Escalate: To increase or make more intense
- De-escalate: To decrease or make less intense

How can we De-escalate Online Cruelty?

- What can the Target do to De-escalate?
 - To avoid seeing more attacks?
 - Prevent the Cyberbully from attacking someone else?
 - Where can they get help?
- What can Upstanders do to De-escalate?
 - When they see offending posts?
 - About the Cyberbully?
 - To assist the Target?

- Have you or a friend ever experienced a situation similar to Stacey's?
- Why is it important to be an upstander rather than a bystander?

Paired Activity: Mapping out the Incidents

- In pairs, we will re-watch the Stacy Story and the first person will write down the incidents that escalated in that story.
- Then the second person will write down how it might have de-escalated if Stacey had some upstanders on her side.

Creating "Dial it Down" Maps

- Start with your handouts and turn them into maps, using elements such as size and color to indicate escalation and de-escalation, and arrows to show the flow of events.
- Add your own ideas of what could happen or may have happened to a friend and illustrate how it could escalate or be de-escalated. Be creative and colorful.

DISTRICT OFFENSES

D-300 Harassment

D-310 Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment⁵³

Engaging in intentional written, verbal, **electronic**, or physical bullying, intimidating, or harassing conduct that: is for the purpose of embarrassing or denigrating another person; physically harms a person or damages the person's property; is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it <u>creates an intimidating or threatening educational environment; has the effect of substantially interfering with the student's education or adult's right to teach or manage student behavior; or has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of the school.</u>

* * * * *

There is no requirement that the person actually possesses the characteristic that is the basis for the bullying, intimidation, or harassment. This includes, but is not limited to,.

conducting electronic bullying, intimidation, and harassment, including, but not limited to, **cyberbullying**, on school grounds, during school activities, on school buses, or during the school day.

The District will respond to off-campus student speech that causes or threatens to cause a substantial disruption on campus or interferes with the right of students to be secure and obtain their education.


